SPECIAL FEATURE ON SOLO VIRTUOSO CELLIST SANTIAGO CAÑON-VALENCIA

Santiago Cañón-Valencia made his orchestral debut as a soloist when he was six years old with the Orquesta Filarmónica de Bogotá. Since then, he has appeared with all the major orchestras in his native Colombia and his international solo career has taken him around the world to perform with orchestras such as the Mariinsky Orchestra with Valery Gergiev, Brussels Philharmonic with Stephane Deneve, St Petersburg Philharmonic with Nikolai Alexeev, Hungarian Radio Symphony Orchestra with Janos Kovacs, Moscow Soloists with Yuri Bashmet, The Orchestre Royal de Chambre de Wallonie with Frank Braley, Orpheus Chamber Orchestra, Münchener Kammerorchester with Clemens Schuldt and Antwerp Symphony with Muhai Tang, among others.

He is probably the most amazing competition winner in all cello history: Winner of the Silver Medal and "Audience Favourite" Award at the 2019 XVI International Tchaikovsky Competition and the 2018 Starker Foundation Award, Mr. Cañón-Valencia has been a fixture of the International Cello Competition scene for many years. He was awarded third prize at the prestigious Queen Elisabeth International Competition 2017 in Brussels. He is also a First Prize winner of the Carlos Prieto International Cello International Gisborne Competition, Beijing Music Competition, International Music Competition, and Lennox International Young Artists Competition. He was also a major prize winner of the Sphinx, Casals, Johansen, Cassadó, and Adam cello competitions.

Highlights of his 2020-2021 season included returning concerto performances in Colombia, Japan, South Africa, the United States, and Russia, as well as debuts as a soloist with Frankfurt Radio Symphony and Christoph Eschenbach, Prague Philharmonia and Phoenix Symphony Orchestra, among others.

Passionate about new music, Mr. Cañón-Valencia was responsible for Carlos Izcaray's world premiere of his Cello Concerto "Stringmaster" alongside Alabama Symphony Orchestra. Santiago also premiered Jorge Pinzón's Cello Concerto "Rapsodia a los 4 Elementos" at the Cartagena International Music Festival 2019. He was also responsible for the Colombian premiere of Ginastera's Cello Concerto No. 2 with the National Symphony Orchestra of Colombia as well as premiering in New Zealand Gulda's Cello Concerto in Auckland, with the Auckland Chamber Orchestra.

Highlights of his 2021-2022 season included returning concerto performances in Colombia and Japan as well as debuts as a soloist with the SWR Symphonieorchester with Andris Poga, Prague Philharmonia, RTVE Symphony Orchestra, Polish National Radio Symphony Orchestra, and appearances at the Dresden, Casals and Moritzburg festivals.
